

The Most Holy Trinity

Up to the Job

Have you ever had a job for which you didn't feel qualified? I think we all have, whether it was a paying gig or not. A lot of us parents often feel in awe of the magnitude of that role and lose sleep worrying that we made the wrong decision in one situation or a bad call in another. Some of us feel intimidated by what our communities need from us, on the parish level or in our personal relationships. Or maybe we are simply dreading a task that seems too big, too overwhelming — that necessary basement cleanout, or the weekly organization of family schedules.

When we don't feel qualified, we don't want to do the work. We get stuck in our own fear. That's the birthplace of procrastination, self-doubt and bitterness. When we look inward at our own abilities, we can only see all the traits that aren't there. The intelligence, the dexterity, the ambition — whatever it is we lack, we get stuck on it.

I've got good news and bad news. I'll start with the bad news: none of us are qualified for the call of discipleship. We simply aren't. We don't have the love or grace or strength to get the job done.

Now I'll give you the good news: God knows this, and He doesn't care. Stewardship does not insist that we possess every good quality — no, as a way of life, stewardship recognizes that we lack so many qualities. But it shows us where to find the love and grace and strength we need. Stewardship does not demand that we know every answer; it merely reminds us who to ask when we don't.

Pope Leo urges parents to raise faithful Catholics in a troubled world

In his first papal homily, Pope Leo XIV delivered a heartfelt



message to Catholic families: stay rooted in Christ—and pass that faith on to your children.

Jesus as model.

“[Jesus] showed us a model of human holiness,” the Pope said, reminding us that God made Himself known in every stage of life: as a trusting child, a curious teenager, and a devout adult. Jesus is the perfect example of obedience, humility, and service—qualities we can nurture in our children.

Parents have a mission.

The pope said, “We are called to bear witness to our joyful faith in Jesus the Savior.” When faith fades, he warned, society loses its moral compass—mercy is ignored, families fall apart, and life feels empty. Passing on the Catholic Faith isn’t just for our children’s sake—it’s how we plant seeds of love and hope that will bear fruit.

Lead by example.

The Pope closed with a challenge, “It is essential that we too repeat with Peter, ‘You are the Christ...’” (Matthew 16:16). The Holy Father said Peter’s response is meant to be ours, too. “It is essential to do this ... in our personal relationship with the Lord, in our commitment to a daily journey of conversion.” If you live as if Jesus is Lord of your whole life, your children will, too.

Thoughtful Moments: St. Aloysius Gonzaga

St. Aloysius wanted to be a priest but had to wait for his father’s approval. As the eldest son of a Marquis, St. Aloysius was expected to inherit the position. After three years, he was permitted to join the Jesuit Order in 1585. His studies for the priesthood were interrupted by a devastating plague. He helped tend the victims and shortly died after



catching the disease. He is remembered for his purity, holiness, penances, and scholarly brilliance.

Jesus reveals the Father’s love

Through the Gospels, Jesus teaches us about God’s incredible love. By His example, He encourages us to respond as sons and daughters to a Father who loves us selflessly, extravagantly, compassionately, infinitely.

“I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep” (John 10, 14-15).
